

Derek Booth has studied landscape processes, geologic hazards, and watershed management for the past 30 years. He first came to Washington State as a field assistant with the US Geological Survey; he subsequently earned his PhD at the University of Washington, studied stormwater with the Basin Planning Program for King County, became a member of the University of Washington faculty as a research professor, and now explores the vagaries of private practice as Senior Geologist and President of Stillwater Sciences, an 80-person environmental consulting firm in California, Oregon, and Washington. He is the Senior Editor of *Quaternary Research*, an international scientific journal of the last two million years of earth and human history, and he is author or coauthor of 26 geologic maps across western Washington and over 50 articles and book chapters. He lived in the Puget Sound area for over 27 years, but he and his wife now divide their time between the glacial landscape of Bainbridge Island and the tectonic landforms of Santa Barbara.
